**Re: Overdose Crisis and Call for Overdose Action Plan**

At the December 15, 2020, Regular Council meeting, Council passed the following resolution:

*WHEREAS the opioid crisis is one of the largest public health emergencies of our lifetime, with a death about every two hours on average and a death toll of over 16,360 since 2016 (January 2016 to March 2020);*

*AND WHEREAS other countries have significantly reduced drug-related fatalities with reforms such as legal regulation of illicit drugs to ensure safe supply and decriminalization for personal use;*

*AND WHEREAS the federal government has indicated it is premature to discuss these measures until there are comprehensive supports for people to get well;*

*AND WHEREAS supports are needed, but measures that save lives are essential if people are to survive and access supports;*

*AND WHEREAS the Canadian Association of Chiefs of Police has stated that they agree the evidence suggests "decriminalization for simple possession as an effective way to reduce the public health and public safety harms associated with substance use", causing the Federal Health Minister to indicate the government is now "deliberating" over decriminalization;*

*AND WHEREAS the overdose crisis rages, showing few signs of abating;*


**THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that Council:**

- a) request that the Government of Canada:
  - i) declare the overdose crisis a national public health emergency so that it is taken seriously and funded appropriately
  - ii) immediately seek input from the people most affected by this crisis and meet with provinces and territories to develop a comprehensive, Pan-Canadian overdose action plan, which includes comprehensive supports and full consideration of reforms that other countries have used to significantly reduce drug-related fatalities and stigma, such as legal regulation of illicit drugs to ensure safe supply of pharmaceutical alternatives to toxic street drugs, and decriminalization for personal use

- b) *forward this motion to other BC municipalities and request they make a similar motion to ask the Government of Canada to address the overdose crisis*

**Subject:** Proposed exotic animals / Dog licencing amendment

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On December 10<sup>th</sup>, 2020 a request was received from a CRD resident to amend Bylaw 1131-2008 to allow the sale and ownership of four-(4) reptile species within District boundaries.

While the request does originate from a CRD resident, living outside of District boundaries, our bylaws restrict species that can be sold within the District.

The four species are:

- Corn snakes
- Leopard geckos
- Ball pythons
- Bearded dragons

Bearded dragons, leopard geckos, and corn snakes are all common household pets that should not pose a safety threat to residents. While Ball Pythons are generally believed to be harmless, they are classified as a constrictor and will grow to the environment they are given to live in. All requested species are indoor reptiles that are considered non-offensive in residential neighbourhoods.

Bylaws in Clearwater, Barriere, Williams Lake, and the Cariboo Regional District do not restrict the ownership or sale of exotic animals, aside from species prohibited by the Province of British Columbia.

The Province of British Columbia has designated more than 1,000 dangerous animals as controlled alien species because they pose a potential threat to people, property, wildlife, and wildlife habitat. Controlled Animal Species are prohibited unless a permit is obtained. None of the requested species are on the controlled list.

A canvas of the local pet stores determined that there is some local demand for these species. Total Pet is the only store selling pets. The Total Pet store manager estimates they receive enquiries almost weekly to bring in a reptile species. The most requested species are bearded dragons, followed by geckos and turtles. Snakes are requested less often; usually for a smaller variety such as a corn snake. Currently, all requests are being directed to Williams Lake to make their purchases.

The SPCA has made available a Model Animal Responsibility Bylaw to assist municipalities in addressing bylaw amendments to accommodate such requests. The SPCA is of the view that a municipality should include a "permitted animals list" as opposed to a prohibited animals list.

Therefore, Administration is seeking comment/direction from Council with respect to the request.

More specifically, Does Council have a desire to exclude the identified animals from the prohibited exotic animals? In whole or in part?

If Council supports, the request; Administration would prepare an Animal Control Amendment Bylaw for Council consideration.

Administration is of the view that if Council supports a change to the current bylaw; the favoured direction is to introduce a "permitted animals list" for inclusion in the bylaw. Hopefully,

#### Dog Licensing:

Administration is recommending the District move to a "non-expiry" process for licensing of dogs in the community. Currently the District offers a free of charge licencing program that requires yearly reminders to dog owners and new tags are issued each year. It would be much more efficient to issue one license that stays with the dog during its residency in 100 Mile House. Although not excessive, it would save time, money and would serve to make life easier on resident dog owners. Moving to a "non-expiry" license would require an amendment to the Animal Control Bylaw.

Dear Councillors,

I would like to bring forth a review of bylaw #1131 regarding the absolute prohibition on exotic animals. I propose an exemption is made for **four** semi-domesticated reptiles: **corn snakes, leopard geckos, ball pythons, and bearded dragons.**

The bylaw in its current form bans the outright sale and ownership of “any animal that is not normally domesticated in Canada or is wild by nature” (*Bylaw #1131, Part 1*). The BC SPCA was contacted regarding this issue and gave permission to include their position. I will review their arguments for consideration.

The BC SPCA gave three reasons to support bans of this nature. They are as follows:

1. A danger to the Public

Many exotic animals do not adapt well to human confinement and can act out in ways that are harmful to humans, often with tragic results. This includes both powerful and poisonous animals.

2. Invasive species risk

A significant concern with exotic animals is if intentionally or accidentally released into the wild they will disrupt and/or displace local ecosystems. Examples of this are seen all over the world, often with devastating effects.

3. Animal welfare

The final concern is the welfare of the animal. All too often an exotic animal is purchased without the proper housing or environment in place to accommodate it. Abused and mistreated animals often lead to over-capacity at rescue shelters once their owner realize they cannot care for them. As a result, these animals live stressed, anxious, and unhappy lives.

The following details why **corn snakes, leopard geckos, ball pythons, and bearded dragons** deserve exemption from bylaw #1131.

These four species have been bred in captivity for over half a century, starting the process of domestication. Although none of them have genetically developed into a subspecies yet (a requirement for full domestication status like chickens, cats or dogs) they are the only reptiles to be considered semi-domesticated, and have produced an incredible array of variation.

Selective breeding has led to more docile and gentle demeanour to come forth, making them prime candidates as pets. None of them are considered dangerous or a risk to local ecosystems as none of them are adapted to live through a British Columbian winter. They are the most common exotic

animals throughout the province, being widely available in many other jurisdictions, with several provincial specialists to refer to should a health issue with one of them arise.

Although the sale and purchase of these animals is easy to regulate within this municipality, the ownership of them is not. People who wish to own one of these four animals will drive to a neighbouring municipality to make their purchase. These animals range anywhere from \$80 to \$500. Each animal requires specific habitat and terrain to house them. This can fluctuate significantly depending on how ornate the owner wishes to be. It is not uncommon to spend between \$200-\$500 on setting up a terrarium suited for a reptile. Recurring costs like food, vitamin supplements, minor medications etc add another \$200-\$500/year. This is thousands of dollars that leave our community each year as a direct result of this bylaw.

Learning about different animals first hand is one of the best ways to develop a more curious and compassionate view of the world and those that inhabit it. Caring for another creature with needs that differ from our own promotes an alternate way of thinking and helps children and adults alike to broaden their view the world around them.

BC introduced some of the strictest exotic animal control laws in the country (*Wildlife Act: Controlled Alien Species Regulation, 2008*) initiated by a fatality from a tiger right here in the 100 Mile House area. One can assume that this bylaw was introduced as a result. Therefore the spirit of this bylaw would be to protect the public from physical harm. If this is the case the four species I have outlined should be exempt as they pose no threat to human life. All four species are small, non-venomous, and are unable to adapt to our climate.

I implore city council to seriously consider amending bylaw #1131 and allow residents to purchase and own these four amazing animals.

## DISTRICT OF 100 MILE HOUSE

### BYLAW NO. 1131

A bylaw to provide for the Control and Licensing of Animals and the Operation of Pound Facilities in the Municipality.

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This bylaw may be cited for all purposes as the ***“District of 100 Mile House Animal Control and Pound Operation Bylaw No. 1131, 2008”***.

The Council of the District of 100 Mile House in open meeting assembled enacts as follows:

#### Part I – Interpretation

1. **“animal”** includes a dog, cat, horse, sheep, goat, mule, ass, swine, rabbit, poultry, llama, cow or other animal of the bovine species;

**“Bylaw Enforcement Officer”** means any person so appointed by Council or pursuant to any enactment to enforce this bylaw and includes peace officers and the poundkeeper;

**“Collector”** means the Director of Financial Administration of the District of 100 Mile House or any person authorized by Council to perform the duties assigned in this bylaw to the Collector:

**“District”** means the area contained within the boundary of the District of 100 Mile House;

**“Exotic Animal”** means any animal that is not normally domesticated in Canada or is wild by nature. Exotic animals include, but not limited to, any of the following orders and families, whether bred in the wild or captivity, and also any of their hybrids with domestic species. The animals listed in parentheses are intended to act as examples and are not to be construed as an exhaustive list or limit the generality of each group of animals, unless otherwise specified:

1. Non-Human primates and prosimians (monkeys, chimpanzees, baboons)
2. Felidae (lions, tigers, bobcats, lynx, cougars, leopards, jaguars, not domesticated cats)
3. Canidae (wolves, coyotes, foxes, jackals, not domesticated dogs)
4. Ursidae (all bears)
5. Reptilia (iguanas, all venomous and constricting snakes)
6. Arachnida (trachulas, scorpions and all venomous spiders)
7. Crocodilia (alligators, crocodiles)
8. Proboscidae (elephants)
9. Hyenanidae (hyenas)

10. Artiodactyla (hippotamuses, giraffes, camels, not cattle or seine or sheep or goats)
11. Procyonidae (raccoons, coatis)
12. Marsupialia (kangaroos, oppossums)
13. Perissodactylea (rhinoceroses, tapirs, not horses or donkeys or mules)
14. Edentara (anteaters, sloths, armadillos)
15. Viverridae (mongooses, civets, and genets)

**“impounded”** means seized, delivered, received or taken into the Pound or into the custody of the Bylaw Enforcement Officer or any officer;

**“incurable/contagious disease”** means any disease, sickness, injury or mutilation which would inevitably result in death, including without limitation, rabies;

**“keeping”** means owning, possessing, having the care, custody or control of, or harbouring;

**“Kennel”** means a facility for the care of four (4) or more dogs, cats or other household pets, where such animals are kept commercially for boarding, propagation, training, grooming or sale;

**“Municipality”** means the Corporation of the District of 100 Mile House;

**“neutered male dog”** means a male dog certified as neutered by any licensed veterinarian;

**“owner”** means any person:

- a) to whom a licence for a dog has been issued under this bylaw;
- b) who owns, is in possession of or has the care, custody or control of any animal;
- c) who harbours or allows any animal to remain about his house, land or premises;

**“Pound”** means any facility, building, structure or enclosure used to harbour and maintain animals pursuant to this bylaw or any vehicle used by the Poundkeeper.

**“Poundkeeper”** means the person or persons that from time to time may be appointed by Council to perform the duties of poundkeeper as specified in this bylaw and shall include the Bylaw Enforcement Officer, Peace Officer and any person acting on behalf of or assisting such Poundkeeper;

**“spayed female dog”** means any female dog certified as spayed by any licensed veterinarian;

- b. such dog shelter shall have secure sides and a secure top, and if it has no bottom secured to the sides, the sides must be imbedded in the ground to a minimum depth of one foot;
- c. every person who possesses or harbours a vicious dog shall not permit, suffer or allow the dog to be on any streets or in any public place or any other place that is not owned or controlled by that person, unless the dog is muzzled to prevent it from biting another animal or human;
- d. The Bylaw Enforcement Officer may request owners of vicious dogs to comply with these regulations.

### **Part 11 – Exotic Animals**

- 11.1 All exotic animals are strictly prohibited within the municipal boundaries.

### **Part 12 – Cat Regulations**

- 12.1 No person shall keep more than three (3) cats at any one time on any parcel within the District, unless such person is the operator of a kennel in the accordance with Section 3.2 of this bylaw.

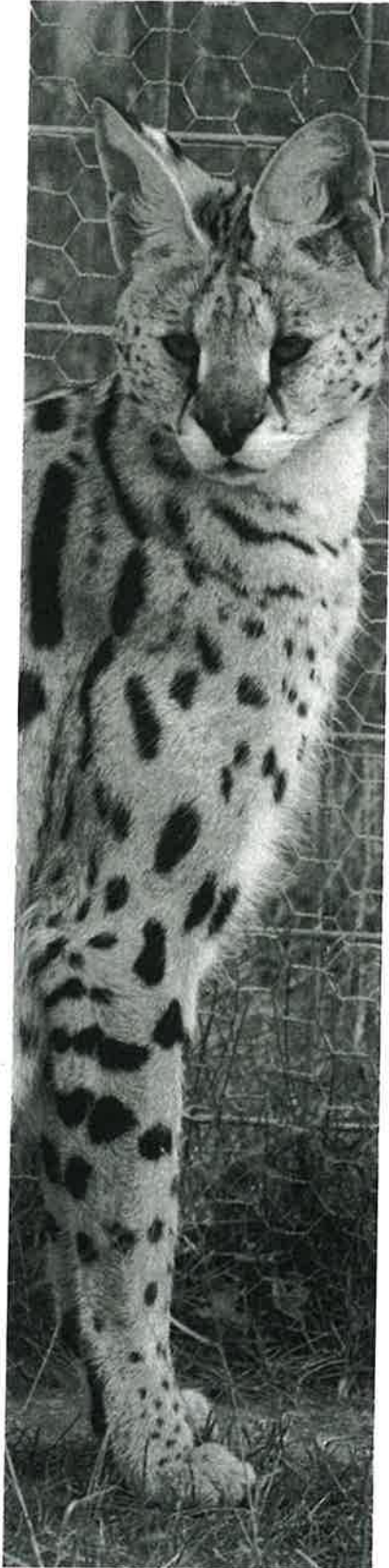
No person shall keep more than three (3) cats at any one time on any parcel within the District, unless such person is a Foster Home for the SPCA. A copy of an authorized SPCA Foster Home Application must be submitted to the District.

- 12.2 Any person that owns more than three (3) cats, prior to adoption of this bylaw, must complete and submit Schedule "A", Grandfathering Consent Form for approval by the District.

### **Part 13 – Penalties and Severability**

- 13.1 Every person who contravenes a provision of this bylaw is guilty of an offence and upon summary conviction is liable to a fine of not more than \$2,000, plus the costs of prosecution.
- 13.2 If any section, subsection or clause of this bylaw is held invalid by a Court of competent jurisdiction, that portion shall be severed and the remainder of this bylaw shall be deemed to have been adopted without the invalid and severed section, subsection or clause.

## Exotic pets and farm animals



Exotic animals present serious public health and safety risks (e.g., disease, physical injuries) and devastating environmental effects through intentional abandonment and escapes (e.g., disease, competition and predation of native species) into both terrestrial and aquatic natural habitats. Although some exotic species will eventually die from starvation or predation when released into a novel environment, others can breed and thrive (e.g., bullfrogs, red-eared slider turtles, pike, carp and other fish) which can become costly to municipal water systems, lakes and ponds.

The Province enacted changes to the *Wildlife Act* in 2008 to prohibit the sale, breeding, importation and display of certain exotic animals in the *Controlled Alien Species Regulation*. This provincial legislation does not apply to thousands of exotic animal species kept in B.C. which remain a serious concern for municipalities. For example, invertebrates (e.g., scorpions, tarantulas) are not regulated by the Province and non-venomous snakes up to 10 feet are still allowed, as are kangaroos, zebras, serval cats, maras, capybaras, large exotic raptors, 200-pound sulcata tortoises invasive fish and invertebrates among many others.

Exotic animals never become domesticated and always retain their wild instincts even if born in captivity. As such, they suffer physically and psychologically under even well-intentioned human care. They may suffer from nutritional deficiencies, suppression of natural behaviours and social structures, inability to achieve natural light/temperature/humidity requirements, and a lack of specialized veterinary care. Often “fad” or “status” pets lose their appeal as they grow and become frustrated and stressed in care, and thus become serious challenges for animal control departments and municipal shelters as no suitable sanctuaries in B.C. exist. Further, most animal control departments do not have specialized training to handle, or appropriate enclosures to house, these exotic species.

As trends in exotic pet ownership change, every year new species of exotic animals are legally brought into the province, sold, bred and sometimes displayed publically in communities. To ensure municipalities are safeguarded and animal welfare is protected, a “*positive list*” of “Allowable Animals” is recommended over a list of prohibited species which would need to be regularly amended. Enactment of a “*positive list*” with a fine structure for non-compliance would provide for clear and efficient enforcement, and can reduce nuisance complaints while protecting communities, pets, local wildlife and the environment.

Recognizing that some exotic animals are already living in communities, the intent of this bylaw is to prohibit the sale, breeding and display of exotic animals to decrease and eventually eliminate their presence in a community. The rehoming and adoption of certain rescued exotics as "Limited Animals" may be permissible to prevent abandonment. Please note, sections 9(1)(c) and 9(3)(c) of the *Community Charter* require ministerial approval prior to a Council adopting a bylaw in relation to wildlife.

### Bylaw

*Adapted from City of Coquitlam Bylaw No. 3838*

**"Allowable Animals"** means a non-native animal, whether domesticated or bred in captivity, that is permitted to be owned, rehomed, adopted, bred, displayed, imported, or sold and is limited to cats (*Felis catus*), dogs (*Canis lupus*), domestic ferrets, domestic mice, domestic pigeons, domestic rats, European rabbits (*Oryctolagus cuniculus*), farm animals, freshwater fish, gerbils, guinea pigs, hamsters and small birds (e.g., budgies, canaries, cockatiels, lovebirds);

**"Animal"** means any member of the Kingdom Animalia excluding humans;

**"Controlled Alien Species"** means a non-native wild animal specified in schedules 1-4 of the *Controlled Alien Species Regulation to the Wildlife Act*;

**"Exotic Animal"** means a non-native wild animal, whether bred in captivity or live-captured and imported from outside of Canada;

**"Farm Animal"** means any domesticated livestock, poultry or insect that is adapted to British Columbia's climate and is limited to alpacas, cattle, chickens, donkeys, ducks, European rabbits, geese, goats, honeybees, horses, llamas, pigs, quail, sheep and turkeys; and

**"Limited Animal"** means an exotic animal that is allowed only to be owned, rehomed or adopted and is limited to bison, camels, chinchillas, degus, hedgehogs, invertebrates, medium and large birds (e.g., African grey parrots, Amazon parrots, macaws, peafowl, emus), small reptiles and amphibians under two (2) metres adult size (e.g., certain snakes, bearded dragons, frogs, salamanders), saltwater fish, sugar gliders, water buffalo and zebras.

### *Exotic Pets and Farm Animals*

1. A person must only possess allowable animals.
2. A person is not permitted to sell, breed, import or display any animal, including limited animals, with the exception of allowable animals.
3. A person who, on the date of the adoption of this bylaw, was keeping any limited animal other than an animal whose ownership in captivity violates existing Provincial or Federal statutes, such as a controlled alien species, may continue to keep that animal under the following conditions until the animal has died or been euthanized:
  - 3.1 The limited animal is kept secure at the owner's premises except for visits to a veterinarian's office; and
  - 3.2 The limited animal is not used in a show, circus or for entertainment or educational purposes.

**Schedule "B" – Permitted Animals**

Only the following animals are permitted in Town, subject to the restrictions set out below:

- ~~agricultural livestock~~
  - ~~only animals that are raised in an agricultural setting to produce farming labour or agricultural commodities are permitted~~
- amphibians
  - only amphibians of the non-poisonous type are permitted
- arachnids
  - only arachnids of the non-venomous type and not from the theraphosidae (tarantulas) family of spiders are permitted
- birds
  - birds are only permitted in compliance with any provincial and federal laws
- cats
- chinchilla
- dogs
- domestic Mice
- domestic Rabbit
- domestic Rats
- ~~equine~~
- ferret
- fish
  - fish are only permitted in compliance with any provincial and federal laws
- gerbil
- guinea pig
- hamster
- hedge hog
- reptiles
  - only reptiles of the non-poisonous and non-venomous type that do not exceed 30 centimetres or 12 inches in length at maturity are permitted
- snakes
  - only snakes of the be non-venomous and non-constrictive type that do not exceed 45 centimeters or 18 inches at maturity are permitted

- Funding Application

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The District has an opportunity to apply for active transportation funding under the Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program – COVID-19 Resilience Infrastructure Stream (CVRIS). The deadline for submissions is January 27<sup>th</sup>, 2021.

This funding initiative is directly aimed at shovel ready projects, hence a very tight timeline. Projects must commence prior to September 30, 2021 and be completed before December 31, 2021.

This funding stream will cover up to 100% of eligible project costs.

**Background**

This project Dogwood Crescent Sidewalk – Cedar Avenue to Aspen Street

The need for this project was first assessed through the creation of the Trails Linkage Plan in 2009. The Trails Linkage Plan recommended that sidewalks be installed in identified locations in existing neighborhoods to improve pedestrian safety and access to bus stops. A sidewalk on Dogwood Crescent will provide pedestrian connectivity to existing sidewalks within the residential area and the downtown core. This sidewalk will serve the existing residential area at the north end of 100 Mile House.

**Scope of Work**

This project will include construction of a 2-meter wide, 650 meter long (approx.), cast in place concrete sidewalk. Project includes base gravels, driveway let downs, and road markings.

The project will also include sanitary upgrades identified during the CCTV program and associated road repairs.


Class D estimates for this project is \$1,050,000.00 inclusive of contingencies.

If Council is supportive of the closure of Birch Ave for this event; the following recommendation is provided for Council consideration.



Bylaw No. 1374

A bylaw to amend the District of 100 Mile House Zoning Bylaw No. 1290, 2016

This bylaw may be cited for all purposes as **"Zoning Amendment Bylaw No. 1374, 2020"**.

The Council of the District of 100 Mile House, in open meeting assembled, enacts as follows:

- (1) That District of 100 Mile House Zoning Bylaw No. 1290, 2016 is hereby amended for that part of DL 4847, Except Plans 7650, 7661, 7898, 7899, 8669, 10009, 10101, 10129, 13207, 13304, 13757, 14040, 15966, 15967, 18594, 21040, 21558, 22913, 24141, 29279, 33851, KAP56655, H123 and EPP88816, Lillooet District, and located generally west of Spruce Avenue, as follows:
  - a) Those lots shown as **Lots 1-17, 22-28, 33, 37-62, 66-74, 82-84, 87-97, and 102-114** on attached Schedule A, which portions are zoned Agriculture Zone (A-1), be rezoned from Agriculture Zone (A-1) to **Residential Low Density Zone (R-1)**;
  - b) Those lots shown as **Lots 18-21, 29-32, 34-36, 63-65, 71-73, 81, 85-86, 98-101** on attached Schedule A, which portions are zoned Agriculture Zone (A-1) and Residential Low Density Zone (R-1), be rezoned from Agriculture Zone (A-1) and Residential Low Density Zone (R-1) to **Residential Duplex Zone (R-2)**;
  - c) Those areas shown as perimeter parkland on attached Schedule A, which portions are zoned Agriculture Zone (A-1) and Residential Low Density Zone (R-1), be rezoned from Agriculture Zone (A-1) and Residential Low Density Zone (R-1) to **Parks and Open Space Zone (P-2)**;
  - d) That consequential map changes be made to Schedule 2 Zoning Bylaw Map District Wide and Main Community Inset;
